Scholarships

More scholarships have come to the school via the US Embassy, which runs an Income Generating Programme for Secondary School Leavers who have not yet had the chance of a university place.

The Headmaster, Robert Kei, put in a proposal for this venture, which has been approved for a six-month period.

Currently 15 students have enrolled for the Advanced Computing Skills and Catering Services scholarships and a further five for Catering Services.

Life is progressing well in the Girls Boarding House. One student wrote of her appreciation of having the opportunity to board, to do homework on the site straight after school, and that drinking water is always available. They play volleyball and basketball outside and chess when they are inside!

The boarders have friends both within the boarding house and also amongst the day girls. They all have serious hopes and ambitions for the future, such as becoming doctors, accountants and other top professionals.

One young female graduate who is helping the school academically needed accommodation. She's now staying in the boarding house and is being trained as another Matron (Deputy) to help with supervision. This is another excellent development.



New Health Clinic

The completed Health Centre has been approved by the Government and, when the school equips it with the required furniture and operating/ inspection table and mattresses in the next two months, medicines will be provided by the Ministry of Health and clinical work can begin.

As for a nurse, the Government will select someone already working for them on their payroll to hold that position, so the school will only have to pay 'incentives'.



The US Embassy ran an essay competition for all secondary schools, the prize being a three week stay in the US.

One of our girl students was the winner and she, accompanied by Madam Charity (our Senior Mistress, pictured above), spent a happy time in Indiana.

Their hosts complimented them both on their behaviour and for being excellent ambassadors for JDMSS and South Sudan.
